

Singing and COVID-19

One of the most important elements of corporate worship is singing. Whether it be a solo, ensemble, choir, or the entire congregation, singing helps us engage our hearts, minds, bodies, and emotions with God and each other in ways nothing else can.

One of the things I have lamented most during the pandemic is not being able to gather together for choir, or as a congregation, to lift up our voices in song to the Lord.

You've probably heard or read how singing in groups can be particularly perilous. Some experts warn singing is as dangerous in spreading the virus as coughing or sneezing.

Physiologically, singing increases airspeed and lung pressure generating many more aerosols and droplets which can spread further. This poses an extremely difficult problem with regard to group rehearsals and singing.

Currently, the University of Colorado and the University of Maryland are researching the aerosols we create when singing or playing a wind instrument. The entire music community, especially the music education community, is very anxious to see the results of the studies.

available by the end of June or beginning of July. I'm very grateful that our orchestra director, Dr. Michael Raiber, is on the front lines of the conversations happening

about this subject among the music education community.

For FBC Norman, we will continue to approach

vocal and instrumental music with wisdom and caution. Our choir and orchestra will continue their COVID-19 sabbatical until further research is available that will help us make wise and informed decisions about group singing and playing.

We will continue to ask everyone in the congregation to wear a face mask while singing. We will also keep the front center section of pew chairs out of the sanctuary to keep at least 12 feet between the platform and the first row of pews so our worship leaders can lead without face masks. Thank you in advance for your cooperation and understanding.
