Finally, we are also looking at ways to develop and use some of our outdoor space for gatherings and worship, especially as summer turns to fall.

I want to thank and encourage

you to continue to give your tithes and offerings in obedience to the Lord and in support of First Baptist. Our year to date giving through June is ahead of our June 2019 giving. Our giving is also ahead of

Our COVID-19 precautions mean that we are no longer able to *pass the plate* as part of our worship service, but let us never forget that giving is an essential part of worship. Life is the beautiful gift of God. It is not always easy, but God promises to be with us. Let us be faithful to live life well — loving God with all that we are and our neighbors as ourselves.

"Having the team come helped give our project a second wind. It was a tremendous encouragement," Matt said.


The First Baptist Church *Called to Serve* team plans to finish several projects at the house so that it can open by early fall.









FBC Local Partners Spotlight

As part of our ministry to our community, First Baptist provides financial support to organizations in Norman who work with individuals, families, and children. Here is a little more information about some organizations we recently supported:

Mary Abbott Children's House 231 E. Symmes

Mary Abbott Children's House is a safe place for children to share their experiences regarding sexual abuse, physical abuse, and neglect, as well as children who are a witness to crime and in drug endangered situations.

Abbott House provides services to children ages 3 to 18 years old from District 21 (Cleveland, McClain, and Garvin counties), as well as surrounding areas. In 2019, more than 1,400 children were able to begin their healing journey after visiting Abbott House.

Although a stand-alone non-profit organization, Abbott House works closely with law enforcement, the district attorney's office, child protective services, mental health care professionals, and medical professionals to maintain a child-friendly atmosphere during investigations of alleged child abuse.

Located in south Oklahoma City, Baptist Children's Home is a familyfocused campus highlighting Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children's (OBHC) Children's Hope program.

Children's Hope was developed to help single mothers, who may have limited or no support/resources, and provide an opportunity to develop a solid foundation for herself and the children in her custody.

The goal of Children's Hope is to help families become productive and more self-sufficient by providing a safe, stable, and nurturing place to live while equipping, assisting, and teaching important skills that support the mother and the children.

FBC MISSIONS MINISTRY SPOTLIGHT BAPTIST WORLD ALLIANCE

The Mission of the Baptist World Alliance (BWA) is to network the Baptist family to impact the world for Christ.

BWA has 240 member bodies working in 125 countries and territories (2017). Programs of the BWA include Baptist World Aid; Mission, Evangelism & Justice; and ministries to men, women, and youth.

In April 2020, BWA launched Standing Together: A Global Response Plan to assist its network of members with needs related to the COVID-19 global pandemic. Through Standing Together, the BWA has offered emergency grants to assist with immediate needs related to the pandemic. In addition, BWA has developed a worldwide aid and relief response facilitated through the Baptist World Alliance Forum for Aid and Development (BFAD), a network of more than 30 international aid agencies.

A COVID-19 microsite was also developed providing resources to assist with remote worship, stories of how Baptists are responding internationally, and a prayer request form.

A 24-hour prayer marathon was organized that included participants from 44 nations – spanning many cultures, multiple generations, and numerous languages.

Religious freedom and human rights monitoring has also been enhanced in all 125 countries and territories. This monitoring focuses on governments that might deny healthcare to religious minorities or seek to permanently close places of worship.

The Baptist World Alliance receives .5 percent of the 11.5 percent designated to missions from the First Baptist general ministry plan.
